(i) Dido – 2018

"Temples and prayers are no use to a woman who is madly in love." (Virgil, *Aeneid* Book 4)

(a) What was Dido's situation before Aeneas and the Trojans arrived in Carthage?

Before Aeneas arrived in Carthage, Dido and her people were exiles from a place called Tyre. They fled after Dido's brother Pygmalion had her husband Sychaeus murdered in secret in exchange for money. Her brother hid the truth of his murder from a grieving Dido and made her believe that her husband would eventually return.

(b) Do you agree with the view that Dido was an innocent victim of Aeneas and the Gods? Give reasons for your answer.

I agree that Dido is an innocent victim of the gods desire for Aeneas to fulfill his destiny. Firstly, Jupiter sends Mercury to inspire her to welcome Aeneas and his crew with open arms and good intentions as they only wish to continue their journey to Italy. Jupiter is not pleased with these events and sends Mercury to Aeneas to compel him to leave Carthage. Pious and dutiful Aeneas decides that it is what he must do for his son and his people. He immediately prepares to leave and heads towards Dido to deliver the news. Aeneas' duty-bound personality will prove catastrophic when it comes to his relationship with Dido.

When he arrives, Dido has already learned of his plans to leave from Rumor. She is in a lovestruck frenzy and calls Aeneas a traitor and reminds him that all of Libya hates her for her relationship with him. Aeneas coldly responds that it is the will of the gods, and they were not technically married which only infuriates her more. Aeneas hastily leaves to escape and attack. Dido, driven mad with love and guilt for betraying her husband Sychaeus' memory, kills herself on a burning funeral pyre of all of Aeneas belongings he left behind.
